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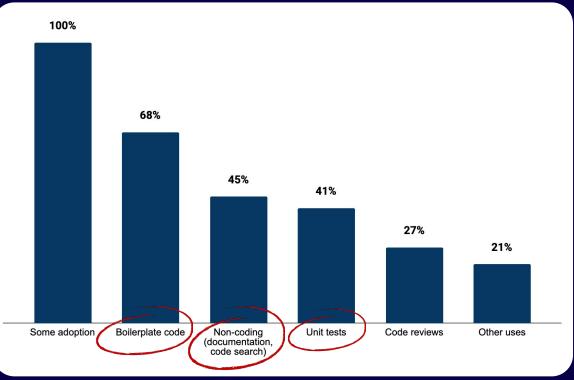

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1 Pacing AI adoption, with an eye on ROI

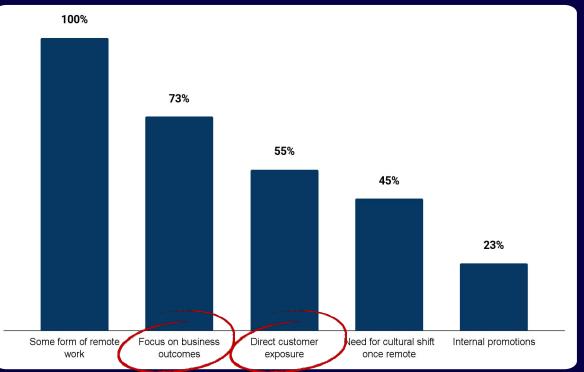

2 Remote, with a strong dose of ownership

- Remote is default, but culture and connection need to be intentional.
- The shift to remote has changed how teams are managed and evaluated.
- "Great distributed teams are not tracked. They are trusted."
- Standout teams are those who treat problems like they own them. For managers, this means that autonomy and clarity matter more than any velocity metric.

2 Remote, with a strong dose of ownership

Staying closer to the work—without micromanaging

2 Stay close to the work. No micromanaging.

- "Management is 99% about discerning signal from noise."
- Data is key, but the most effective leaders aren't buried in dashboards.
- They experiment with tools, ship internal prototypes, and stay hands-on with what their teams are navigating.
- It's not about being the smartest in the room—it's about understanding enough to lead with empathy and clarity.

2 Stay close. No micromanaging.
